Medic beats corporates to scoop top leadership award

e was recently named the 2013
Kirit Dave Manager of the Year
during this year's edition of
Company of the Year Awards
(COYA) organised by the Kenya Institute of
Management (KIM) and various partners.
This is none other than reproductive health
specialist Dr. John Ong'ech, who is also the
Head of Reproductive Health Department at
the biggest teaching and referral health facility
in the country, Kenyatta National Hospital.

The award was introduced in remembrance of the late Kirit Dave, a successful businessman and a member of KIM Board of Fellows. This was after a thorough evaluation of Dr. Ong'ech's leadership and governance at the hospital and how his contribution has transformed the mode of operations in the organization in promoting its vision and mission.

The award has not only elevated his managerial skills but has also raised the bar for KNH, the oldest and biggest health facility that has saved the lives of many people from the entire region since its inception in 1901.

"Although I believe in transformational leadership and culture change for the better, I least expected that I could beat the more than 10 competitors mostly drawn from the corporate world," Dr. Ong'ech says during an interview with the Standard.

He says since he took over leadership as the Head of Department at the Gynecology and Obstetrics Wing in 2009, change has been evident.

"We have managed to shorten turn-around time especially in the labour wards and reduced maternal mortality by 15 per cent through several interventions," he reveals. Some of his achievements include:

Enhancing quality service delivery in reproductive health: Has contributed significantly in improving Maternal newborn Health through introduction of the now famous Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission (PMTC) of HIV program in 2003, an initiative that has improved maternal health and minimized mother to child transmission of HIV.

Innovations and
Research: Last year, KNH
pulled a first by introducing
the PartoPen and Partograph
technology that is used in
determining the progress of
a pregnancy until the time of
delivery.

This was in partnership
with the University of
Colorado, which now
enables staff in the labour
ward to use paper-based
system in monitoring
maternal labor, which
has helped reduce
life-threatening

complications
in pregnancy in
low-resource
environments.
"This software
tool is one of its kind
and has never been used
anywhere in Africa. It has
contributed to quality of
care and timely decision
making, which is of
essence in this section,"
says the Doctor.

Currently, KNH's labour ward has 20 of such pens and each comes with a

charger.

The department also introduced a Hotline number in Labour ward to enhance effective communication and facilitate early referrals to KNH, thereby reducing late referrals and maternal deaths.

The Organizational Performance Index (OPI): He also chairs the hospital's OPI committee which has developed performance tools that to guide the hospital in enhancing competitiveness.

"Through these guidelines, this facility has improved its operations in various sectors. Several major departments have now embraced open leadersh p and strive towards customer satisfaction. We have also submitted our operation standards for external validation to the Joint Commission International (JCI), the highest hospital accreditation that only few hospitals in Africa have achieved," Dr. Ong'ech reveals.

He has also been honoured with other

prestigious awards. He was the first Kenyan to receive Hubert Humphrey alumni impact award in recognition of his community contribution in Health, Education, mentorship and leadership.

He is the Alumnus of the coveted US Government sponsored training program dubbed Hurbert H Humphrey (HHH) Fellow, becoming the first Kenyan recipient of such.

In addition, Dr. Ong'ech is also the recipient of the World Health Organization (WHO) Best Practices award after he pioneered the introduction of Intra-partum HIV Testing in 2003.

As COYA's Manager of the Year, he hopes to influence other managers especially within KNH to make the facility a model hospital and fast-track efficient service delivery.

"I believe in creating solutions to challenges. With commitment and goodwill from all, we can achieve so much."
